Attendees:- David Basham - MP Finnis, Adrian Pederick - MP Strathalbyn, Keith Parkes - Mayor for Alexandrina Council, Andrew Baker - Operations Manager Alexandrina Council, Joanna - Hydrologist River Murray Commission, SES Flood Senior Manager and SA Power Networks.

The SES Flood Senior Manager opened the meeting with a description of the Lower Lakes situation in regard to the Milang Shack's which are now slowly being inundated with flood water seepage. Joanna explained that they have been caught out with a prolonged southerly wind above 30 k.p.h. along with "King Tides". She went on to explain that the water height at Milang is currently 1.1 metres and that over the next two weeks it could rise to 1.3 metres in Milang.

SA Power Networks explained that for safety reasons the power would be cut off at the shacks as many shacks had water heater systems that were now under water. He explained that the water now had power running through it and was totally unsafe for anyone to be in the location. He explained that each residence would be required to have an electrician issue a certificate of safety prior to the electricity being switched on.

SA Power believe that at this stage it should only be off for a maximum of two weeks. Shack owners criticised them for turning the power off without any notice, but they explained that this happened suddenly and that already some shacks had power contacting water which meant that anyone coming into contact to the water would be electrocuted.

SES also issued a warning about snakes being forced from swamp-lands due to water inundation. They have issued a list of snake catchers which they will pay for.

Lake Height at Milang now is 1.1 metres and flow is 190 Gigalitres per day and maximum over the next two weeks is not expected to exceed 1.3 metres.

With the impending threat of flooding to the Milang shacks an urgent call went out for help to sandbag the new Youth Groups Hub at 9am in the morning.



By 11am a group of about 25 people and youths busied them selves in the sand-bagging. Once again the people of Milang jumped to the volunteering and quickly not only sandbagged the youth hub but also a large portion of the front shacks.



Thankfully only a few shacks were effected by the water but the water was kept at bay by the fantastic work of volunteers,







When one door opens — Another door closes

The famous saying, "when one door closes, another door opens," is a famous quote by Alexander Graham Bell. The quote ends with "but we often look so long and so regretfully upon the closed door that we do not see the ones which open for us."


9. You Find Out Who Your Real Friends Are



006 OP K9 "Reilly" 01.06.13 – 23.12.22

This is not easy writing about the passing of Reilly but speaking about her gives me great happy memories and helped me through a difficult stage in my life.

Reilly was born in a litter of 8, 4 females and 4 males (the "R" litter). All of the pups went onto become Guide Dogs and Assistance Dogs on their completion through the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB). A 100% success rate that hasn't been achieved before. The Operation K9 program was born that year also and employed a young lady 'Anne Spader' from the United



States. Anne had completed her university degree in Dog Psychology and Training and soon was employed to train dogs for Veterans in the US. Anne was employed for 3 years by the RSB with an apprentice and the OP K9 program was off the ground and helping veterans here in Australia.

The very first day I got to see Reilly was when I was in Fullerton Hospital undergoing treatment for Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) from my service in Somalia. Anne had arranged for me to meet her at Victoria Park Racecourse down the road and it was a very surreal moment, a very happy Reilly, very confident and loveable Labrador. We spent nearly an hour on our 1st visit and she soon made it clear to me that I was to leave that hospital and start the 2 week bonding course and get to know all of Reilly's commands. I left that hospital very quickly to start the new program.

Before I knew it I was starting my training with Reilly at the Gilles Plains RSB and it never occurred to me that it was the start of a fantastic relationship with both Reilly and the RSB. Jane Reilly, the public figure here in SA had name sake for one of the "R" litters and called one female pup Reilly. I got to meet Jane and she would always keep progress on her training. By September 2015 I was matched with Reilly and we graduated together at a ceremony at Torrens Parade ground. Plenty of gifts, speeches and a lunch was provided with plenty of photo's taken.

From now on and for the next 8 years, Reilly never left my side and she spent time relaxing with my parents where she grew a strong bond as well. Reilly had a good routine in assisting me when my mind would stray and cause me anxiety. She soon knew how to retrieve my wallet, keys and phone when I had misplaced them (virtually 3 times a day). She loved this task and had her tail wagging almost all of the time.

Reilly soon took to the lake, this would be one of her favourite places from chasing balls, jetty jumping, sailing and kayaking, she simply loved the lake. Reilly and I would travel now and again from Milang to QLD, NSW and VIC and all around SA. Mainly I travelled alone with the company of Reilly, she was just simply the best companion to travel with. Reilly would take all of the stress away.

Reilly enabled me to march on ANZAC Day confidently and we first marched together on ANZAC Day 2016 in Sydney in front of tens of thousands of people. Reilly made me re-engage with long lost veteran friends and I was unaware of how much of an impact she was having on my life.

We have been through every moment together and they have been the most joyous moments. Reilly has made me avoid some very dark memories and taught me that PTSD is not something to be afraid of or embarrassed about. She has definitely made me more confident in social environments where before I faked it in social gatherings. We also attended formal dinners', breakfasts etc that required suits and tie with the RSB.

I quite simply could keep writing about the times I had with Reilly, but I cannot say or fit it in the magazine, there would not be enough room. Together we have been on an amazing journey and that has been the best journey of my life, full of happiness and she was always there for me. I just couldn't imagine my life if she was not a part of it.

Reilly's health deteriorated very rapidly within 3 days, but she always remained happy, wagging her tail, chasing ball and sleeping alongside me which she did all of her life. Reilly was to go in for surgery to remove a small lump. After X-rays before her operation the Veterinarian told me she has malignant aggressive cancer and it was throughout her whole body. She was given 24 hours to live. I certainly did not want her to go through any pain, so myself and the RSB made the decision to put Reilly to sleep. After spending 3 hours of our last quality time together and her wagging her tail, my best friend fell asleep in my arms while kissing the top of her head. I was a mess, I simply could not stop my tears, 4 weeks later and I am still crying.

These are not tears of trauma, these are tears of how Reilly impacted my life and had shown me feelings that were lost years ago in Africa. Reilly has never left me, she left a huge legacy behind with me that a lot of people never got to see. The RSB journey has been life changing and hopefully shortly I will continue that journey that Reilly left.



MEC Treasurer and "Boss Dinosaur" Don Boyce, a Milang resident for 30 years has been a volunteer for over 25 years. Don is familiar with much of the history of the area and the community services that have developed and evolved. Don first volunteered in what was a garden centre with Trevor Taylor at the now MEC site. Don also volunteered long-term with the Milang Progress Association, Milang District Association, the Art Group, and the start-up period of the Historic Railway. Don recalls helping to produce and distribute the early version 'Community News,' delivering daily Meals on Wheels and driving a Massey Ferguson tractor to maintain safe local walking trails.

Don was born in Stirling. He declined to say when although admits that he was a difficult individual from the outset forcing his mother to endure a 14-hour delivery labour. MEC volunteers confirm that this 'difficult' aspect of Don remains strongly reflected in his preference for routine. The MEC gate opens at precisely 10 am and recyclables processing is proficiently systematic. Don departs for lunch at exactly 12 noon but may quietly reappear suddenly at any time to check and

ensure volunteers are maintaining a high level of efficiency.

Don told "News" that he remembers his family waterfront shack located where the caravan park is now situated was damaged in the 1956 flood. "We simply opened the windows and the water flowed through."

Don also recounted a time when he and another volunteer (Roger) were delivering a big load of cans to Adelaide. They stopped at McLaren Vale to check the load only to discover a bag of 1800 cans missing and not found by backtracking to Milang. At 2 am a voice in his head told him to check the Finnis Road and sure enough he found the bag next day almost hidden up against a farm fence behind trees.

Don Boyce is fine example of the many selfless volunteers who help make the Milang and district community such a wonderful place to live in. Don is highly respected by his volunteer colleagues and popular with MEC customers, particularly Lyla the Cake Lady who regularly presents Don with fresh-baked cakes which he unselfishly shares with other volunteers. Don has seen many changes at what is now MEC, and his continued devotion to ensuring an efficient, safe workplace and volunteer-friendly operating systems for this community service is appreciated and admirable.

With the impending flood levels that could affect the shack area combined with the intended use of The Old Regatta Club for the Youth Project it was decided to move the Butter Factory items back home so to speak.

Now that the can washing shed has been all but completed, we made space up the northern end and stowed our gear. This gave Already Read Books the rest of the shed for their displays and sales area. At the last working bee for the year, we had a BBQ lunch to thank all those who helped on the project during the year.

The start of 2023 had the 'book girls' and willing helpers set up their great little store just in time for the Power Rally weekend, all books and fittings have been donated, with a wonderful result achieved, for more details see the article in this magazine.

Our side fence with its impressive sliding gate has been completed. With the jobs and timeline for work to be carried out by both contractors and volunteers in place, we set to work on the first working bee of the year jackhammering a trench along the concrete in the pergola so as not to upset the old brick drain.

NO 59 - CREAM AND MILK SUPPLIERS TO MILANG BUTTER FACTORY – THE MATHERSONS

Mr Hugh I C Matherson came from Ros Shire, Scotland in 1854 to manage a property for Donald Gollan. I believe he sailed in a ship called the *Oregon*. Hugh Matherson then settled on Section 2800 at Angas Plains. Their dairying business was well attended to, and their cream and milk delivered to the Milang Butter Factory was of a high standard.

Hugh Matherson's three single daughters were all school teachers, and taught for many years in and around the Milang area. Margaret taught at Point Sturt, Bletchley, Lake Plains and Mines Flat, Isabella at Lake Plains for 18 years and May taught at Ashbourne.


In 1903, Hugh's son, Alexander, purchased Block No 48 in the *Watson Park* subdivision, which was opened up by the SA government under the Closer Settlement Legislation.

In 1915, the Milang Agricultural Bureau, with five other members, presented papers for 1914-1915 period at their second AGM.

Later, Alexander's son Alistair left the dairying industry to become the secretary of the South Australian Country Party, a political party which was formed in 1917 and dissolved in 1932.

The Mathersons were a highly respected family and always supported Milang functions and local organisations.

Hugh Matherson died in 1915 and Alexander continued farming Section 2800 Angas Plains until the property was sold in 1947 to Donald and Margaret Warren.

Empower People to Save Wildlife

(Part 2)

Closer to home, a partnership between FAME and the Department of Environment SA, western quolls, absent for over 100 years from the Flinders ranges, have been successfully reintroduced and are contributing to the local biodiversity and should, in the future, benefit local farmers by controlling rabbits.

In the Alexandrina and Victor Harbor precincts, it is estimated, there are 160 threatened native animals (Threatened species of the Lower Lakes and Coorong and Natural History of Strathalbyn & Goolwa Districts Strathalbyn Naturalist Club Inc. 2000). This number may vary with different sources, however, it would be widely acknowledged to be precariously high and unsustainable and it would be impossible to reverse using existing strategies. If we don't try something else, we will inevitably lose species.

For many of those species, recovery is hampered and prevented by the existence of foxes and cats within the environment. If we are again to share our homes with species like the eastern quolls, bettongs, southern brown bandicoots, potoroos, phascogales, heath goannas, bilby's and magpie geese, we have to ensure there are suitable safe habitats for them in our area.



Fortunately, we have had successful landscape vegetation rehabilitation projects working away in our midst for many years and some progress has been made to improve plant biodiversity. Unfortunately, apart from

some isolated fenced habitats, and despite the constant publicity about the impact of foxes and cats, over many years, very little has been done to reduce their influence across the wider environment. In the north, where dingoes are allowed to reassemble their social structures, cats and foxes are controlled in most places. South of the dingo fence however, apart from the odd cull of cats and foxes, they are still one of the most important drivers of extinction. There is very little chance for successful reintroduction of many of our native mammals, birds and reptiles whilst these two mesopredators continue to overwhelm our fauna.

Reversing this catastrophic impact can be achieved by involving the general human population to contain cats and foxes to a level that can be tolerated by wildlife. To control cats and foxes, we humans have to adopt the role of dingoes like north of the dingo fence. Ordinary people, with guidance and supervision, can be involved with trapping, shooting and poisoning these 2 feral predators. The successful reintroduction of the western quoll, from Western Australia, into the Flinders ranges, has been largely due to the control of foxes and cats. This has been one of the first successful translocations of native mammals into an unfenced environment. With everyone's involvement, we can reproduce the same thing in our local precincts, by involving ordinary people, with the help of local, state and the federal governments. The advantages for wildlife, humans and primary industry stock, are many.

The benefits of controlling foxes and cats will be immediately felt. There will be direct population increases of a range of smaller wildlife which still exist but are currently depressed and threatened by cats and foxes. There will also be indirect benefits for soil biodiversity and plant diversity as well as public health which will improve resulting from a more liveable environment and less incidence of human depression.

Sharing our homes with nature will be so rewarding. Reductions in cat numbers resulting from human cooperation, will lessen the risk of human Toxoplasmosis spread by cats. Cat-dependent diseases cost Australia AU\$6 billion per year through impacts on human health and livestock production (Legge et al, 2020). Alarmingly, currently 30-66% of people in Australia carry the Toxoplasma gondii parasite. Reducing cat numbers will reduce transmission of the T. gondii parasite (Smith and Furtado 2022).

HISTORIC GRAVES IN THE MILANG CEMETERY No. 22 - KRUSE

Carl Heinrich Ferdinand Kruse married Mary Loney on the 8th June 1857. Carl was born in 1823 and Mary in 1857. Carl died in 1911 and Mary in 1891. The couple had 4 children Mary Christine Catherine, Sabine Charlotte Elizabeth, Heindrich Christian Ferdinand and Honora Martha Johanna. Mary married Henry Hoare and they had 5 children. Mary and Henry are buried in the Milang Cemetery. Sabine's granddaughter Annie Elizabeth died aged 3 months in 1881. Carl and Mary lived on the corner of Coxe and McDonald Streets.

Carl was a captain of the schooner 'Punkeri' for twenty years until she sank in 1890. He had the schooner Ada and Clara built in 1892. His son Heinrich (Fardie) born in 1864 started with his dad on the Punkeri, was an engineer on the P.S.Jupiter and later a captain.



Carl was a life member of the Regatta Club. Heinrich was chairman of the Council for several years in the 1930's and died while still in office. While (Kardie) Kruse was working on the steamer (Dispatch) as a deck hand, he had the rare experience of talking with Prince George (later King George V) and his brother Prince Albert while the two princes were being taken across the lake in 1881 to join in a Kangaroo hunt at Campbell Park, the property of the Bowman family.

A section of my grandfather's farm was always known as 'Kruses'. It appears that Carl or his son (Fardie) could have applied Tort to his land (under perpetual leasehold), it meant that in order to gain 'Freehold' you had to roll the Mallee, burn it, clear the land of stumps and sow and reap a profitable crop off the block within 5 years. As Carl and his son were 'Rivermen' they would have had no hope of doing this. My grandfather's farm adjoined (Ben Hopgood) and he had the means of doing this with his farm machinery. My grandfather would have rolled and burnt the scrub, carted off the stums and got it to a cropable stage.



His diary states that in 1913 he put in 28 ½ acres for Kruse and in 1914 he stripped and cleaned the wheat for £41.13.0. In 1914 his diary states, work done for Kruse £33.10.0 and in 1915 work done for Kruse £13.6.0. It is worth remembering that 1914 was the worst drought in South Australia's history and many farmers reaped nothing. Grandfather's idea was to plant the crop thinly, less competition for moisture. It certainly paid off in 1914.

Heinrich (Fardie) Kruse married Kate Miller and the couple had 4 children. Henry Joseph died aged 6 years, Ferdinand Ernest born in 1889 may have had some interest in the Kruse's farm block as his name appears in my grandfather's diary in 1915. Mary Kruse born in 1892 married Ray Perry in the Milang Congregational Church in 1923. They had one son Norman Ray Perry born in 1925 who had a wonderful singing voice and some said he should be trained as an Opera singer. The old Perry home is near the racecourse in Strathalbyn and the farm consisted of several hundred acres.

Norman married Ramona Sansome and the couple had 3 children, Ian, Heather and Bronwyn. Ian had 6 children, 4 boys and 2 girls, April, Reece, Crystal, Ryan, Rhett and Riley. Two of these boys played junior football and cricket for Milang with my grandsons and later went on to play football for Hahndorf also with my grandsons. Carl and Mary's 4th child was Honora Martha Johanna of whom we know little except that she married George Burgess in 1901.

The old Kruse home at the end of Coxe Street is one of the oldest homes in Milang that is still being lived in. It has changed very little since Captain Kruse and his family lived there in 1889. We have an excellent photo of the home in 1889 with the family pictured outside the front verandah (see below).
