



An Abundance of Local Talent

It is said that the Fleurieu Region has more artists per head than any other region in Australia. I don't know how true this claim is but I would not be surprised of its validity. Make a concerted effort next time you are out and about to look around every time you enter a building and you will notice how many wineries, cafes, hotels and even local businesses display the work of local artists. The talent and styles are vast and varied with something for everyone's tastes.

Even here in tiny Clayton Bay, is the home to a numerous array of artisans - painters, mosaicists, metal work sculptors, concert pianist, weavers and various makers of jewellery, glass, ceramic and wood creations. Our yearly community SALA event, held in the community hall attracted 22 local artisans and their wares in 2023, and gets larger every year.

Strathalbyn have their very own Art Gallery and art trail for you to follow. You can pick up a pamphlet guide from the Stationmaster's Art Gallery (next door to the Strath Info Centre). The Stationmaster's prides itself in supporting local artists and the community as a whole. It hosts around 40 exhibiting members and new exhibition displays are changed over every 2 months, so there is always something new to view.

Next year, Clayton Bay artist, Madeleine Elkin will be running a weekly Thursday Adult Art Class in the Stationmaster's Redhen. Her background experience consists of 6 years general painting classes at a private art school and completion of over 40 workshops to date with local and interstate renowned artists.

Madeleine considers herself to be an impressionistic colourist painter of Australiana and works in both acrylic and oils. Her current work of landscapes and nature is inspired by her environment around the Alexandrina Lake.

Capturing the ever changing light with splashes of colour and high contrasts to impart a sense of mood and feeling of a place rather than a representational drawing. Working thickly with luscious oils and palette knives she carves into the paint, conveying the ambiguous status of nature - its life and movement and eventual decay. OBITUARY

Mervyn Aworth Hopgood

05 February 1938 – 24 November 2023


Written by David and read out by all of the Hopgood boys as his Eulogy during the funeral on 6th December 2023 at Milana Church of Christ.

Mervyn Aworth Hopgood was born 5th February 1938 in Strathalbyn Hospital to Whinham and Jean Hopgood, in the same place where he was to pass away 85 years later. He was married to Joyce for 56 years and had 4 sons - Mark, Andrew David, and Gregory.

His ancestors were pioneers in the Milang district even before the township of Milang was gazetted. Mervyn's paternal and maternal greatgrandmothers were foundation members of the Milang Church of Christ in 1858. Mervyn is survived by his two brothers Alvyn and Kevyn and has enjoyed strong relationships with his many nieces and nephews.

Mervyn had an interesting early life, but times were often difficult. He attended Milang Primary School from 1943. There were no buses, everyone walked or rode bikes. Students were drummed into school and their hands were inspected for cleanliness. The cane was often used. He was lefthanded but was told he had to write with his right hand. It was frustrating and he eventually was allowed to revert to being left-handed.

His father was a stone mason, carpenter, and builder but times were tough as there was little work due to the war. Most families had to be self-sufficient to survive. They lived on the corner opposite the Milang Memorial Park where there are currently abundant Olive trees. They had a house cow to sell milk to the Milang Cheese Factory, an orchard to preserve enough fruit to last the year and a vegetable garden. Most of the surplus fruits going into homemade tomato sauce and chutneys. Mervyn and his brothers often trapped rabbits for pocket money.





At Strathalbyn High in 1951, he had just turned 13 and continued his long-lasting friendship with Trevor Schmook. They had formed a shared love of football and cricket. The high school days were long, his Joyce made a cut lunch because they left home at 7 and returned at 5. The old bus was a community bus and took at least 2 hours each way between Milang and Strathalbyn.

A major turning point in Mervyn's life was when his mother Jean became unwell. He left high school to care for her. He looked after chores, shopping, animals and loved keeping her company at night. She was very religious, and Mervyn continued on with her faith until his last days.

Mervyn's mother passed at a young age, and it left an incredible void. Sport would fill this void.

Cricket was Mervyn's favourite summer sport. At 13 he was good enough to play local A grade, but he was too young. So, he tried Tennis and he excelled at that too. In winter Mervyn played for the Milang Football Club and was in the Premiership teams in 1962, 64 and 65. He played over 200 games for Milang and was runner up best & fairest. During one game Mervyn injured his leg above the ankle, but continued on playing only to find out that his leg was fractured.

In Summer, his Cricket team Milang A grade was an invincible team. He was a left arm bowler and he had 3 ambitions — to get a century, a premiership and get the best batting average. He did all three and had 3 premierships. Mervyn eventually retired from sport at age 29 and thought himself pretty lucky to only have a ruptured disc in his back and a fractured ankle. He continued to volunteer during the 80's and 90's in the Milang and Langhorne Creek region and was a great role model and coach, producing many great local cricketers.

This love of sport flowed onto all 4 of his sons and grandsons. If we weren't playing sport, we all loved sitting around talking to Mervyn about sport and watching the test matches and AFL games every time we could. Phone calls were generally about the sports scores before anything else. He loved going to the local football and cricket to watch his Grandsons Brayden & Dylan and was proud of Greg when he went on to coach of local cricket and football himself.

After leaving school, Mervyn started working for the biggest winery in the region - Bleasdale Winery and he lived with his cousin Elva. His father and Fred Potts taught him how to prune, which led to his interest in grafting. He became an avid horticulturalist, which is evident in the gardens he developed at our home at 9 Coxe St.

Mervyns' adult and work life was framed by some very memorable characters. Uncle Syd Overall was one of them, he was an eccentric character but an extremely hard-working, community minded man who had a huge impact on Mervyn's life. In 1930 Syd bought 160 acres on the Milang Finniss Road and established a small dairy. This farm would eventually become the Hopgood dairy farm where Joyce and Mervyn raised us 4 boys. Mervyn bought 40 acres from Syd and when building the house, he handmade over 30,000 bricks for the internal walls using the sand from the end of McDonald Street. We still have the brick machine, and this house is currently on the corner of Waroona Drive and Watson Street.

In 1967, Joyce and Mervyn were married in this church, after a game of footy of course.... They had known each other all their lives. Joyce's grandfather was the caretaker of the Soldiers' Memorial Park here in Milang and Mervyn often said he sneaked through her grandfather's back yard on his way to school never to know he would end up marrying his granddaughter. They had a short honeymoon in Brownhill Creek and the Yorke Peninsula which they revisited last year to celebrate their 55th wedding anniversary.

Twins Andrew and Mark born in 1968, were followed by David and Greg. Can you imagine 4 boys within 3 years? Mervyn said their patience and endurance was tested. As us boys got older, we started to be more involved with helping Mervyn with the farm work. As you can imagine though, there were many mishaps. There were broken bones, numerous stitches, reconstructed joints and even a fishhook in the mouth. I think in Mervyn's book, he refers to our growing up as 'living dangerously" and that we must have had a guardian angel, so those weekends in Sunday school really paid off....

We moved from Milang in the early 80's and bought the farm at Langhorne Creek just up from Bleasdale. During this time Mervyn had recurring back problems, so Mark had to leave school to help on the dairy farm. Mark followed in Mervyn's footsteps in Dairy Farming and eventually continued this calling in NZ. This gave Mervyn and Mark a strong bond and a shared passion for animals and dairy farming. They could talk for hours every week about farming and the cricket and footy scores.

All of us boys worked around the district in different jobs and had the opportunity to work for retired Lt Col Bruce Rogers, father to Jeremy here today. He was a massive influence on us all. In the late 80's, 3 of us boys joined the Army. Joyce & Mervyn came to all 3 passing out parades in Wagga Wagga. It was their first trip out of the state. In recent years, Joyce & Mervyn enjoyed travel to Kangaroo Island, Queensland, the snowfields in Victoria with the grandkids, to New Zealand to visit Mark, The Indian Pacific from Sydney and with David and grandchildren to the Battlefields France, UK, and Europe.

In the late 90's, Joyce & Mervyn moved back to Milang and built their current house. They worked together in the local vineyards pruning for over a decade. The home at Coxe Street has been a home where they have enjoyed their grandchildren and more recently great grandchildren. Mervyn was dearly loved by his three daughters in law – Deb, Cath & Keikey. Mervyn was also "POP" to 2 grandchildren here in Adelaide Hills (Brayden & Dylan) who have inherited their Pop's sporting skills and 2 Grandchildren (Benjamin & Tameeka) in Townsville who have given the joy of 3 great grandchildren (Blake, Noah and Ally).

Mervyn had many interests and was a respected community member, always giving his time volunteering and helping others. He was actively involved in the Milang cubs & scouts, school council, Agricultural Bureau, Milang Football oval and community gardens. He played lawn bowls in a team with his sons and was always an active community member. He was still delivering meals to his elderly long-time friend, neighbour, and mother figure "FLO Coppins" until she passed away in her late 90's.

He was actively involved in the Milang Cemetery Restoration Group, and he would often be found on his gopher, leaving Joyce a note on the table – "I'm up the cemetery"! He was often working away researching local history, restoring headstones, and making sure the gardens were cared for. He knew every single grave marked and unmarked. Even in his last days he was telling us which war graves needed a flag and a cross for Remembrance Day. I am certain Mervyn will be proud of his sons who have vowed to continue his legacy in maintaining the local cemetery.

He also had an interest in reading, particularly non-fiction historical books and biographies. He was still reading even the day before he went to hospital. Mervyn was a member of the Milang Writers Group and enjoyed writing about local history and often shared this through the community newsletters. We are proud that Mervyn has self-published a book titled "A friend in need, is a friend indeed".

His Christian faith guided him during tough times in his life. There was one such difficult time, but he only really opened up and discussed it in his book. This injustice that occurred during his school years and had a huge impact on Mervyn's life. We admire his strength to speak out and seek justice, not only for himself but for other victims of abuse. This time in his life must have been incredibly difficult following the loss of his mother. But Mervyn's faith, passed on from his mother, guided him always. Even in his last weeks, with the support of Church of Christ members, he was still making peace with these difficult times. We thank them for taking the time to support us all.

Mervyn was very organised in planning his own funeral and was very clear in what he wanted and how he wanted to say it. I had the honour of sitting with him going through the memoir that he wrote, as a guide for this eulogy. He wanted his four sons to read a part each and the main thing he wanted people to know was that any highlight in his life story was a group effort and he didn't want it to sound like it was his individual effort. I think that just goes to show the selfless man that he was.

Over the last 10 years Mervyn had health issues stemming from a poor heart, followed by a stroke. Joyce was instrumental in ensuring Mervyn's life was one of shared moments and making the best of every day. They were always together.

A couple of months ago, Mervyn's health deteriorated due to his failing heart. His heart was operating at only 10-20%. My wife Cath & I came home and moved in to help Joyce care for Mervyn as he didn't want to go to hospital. Mervyn slept in his recliner chair every day and night, but he always wanted Joyce with him. She slept in the chair beside him for 6 weeks. Picking him flowers from his garden for him to see and smell and providing every type of food and drink that he suddenly had an urge to try.

These 6 weeks were a team family effort, which showed just how loved Mervyn was. Andrew came from Adelaide every other day. Mervyn would always entrust Greg with tasks to develop welded contraptions to add to his chair - to make it more comfortable. Mark in NZ was on facetime every chance he could, and they were still talking cows and cricket.

We all have some incredibly funny memories with Mervyn during these weeks. He was such a character with a wonderful sense of humour. He had his own language, funny stories and limericks and a way of making up words and sayings that we will all take away with us - as a unique memory of Mervyn.

Grandkids, family, and friends visited frequently. You could see how loved he was by the coming and going of visitors. When he made the decision to go to hospital in his last week, we all had a night with him in hospital. Mark sadly couldn't get back from New Zealand in time, but Mervyn really enjoyed his facetime chats.

But in the end, it was Joyce who he had always asked for. She could be seen sleeping in the chair next to him, gently holding his hand and putting his heart at rest, letting him know that she will be OK. It was inspiring to see the love they had between them.

Mervyn will be missed by so many; he had a profound impact on everyone he came into contact with. His quiet unassuming gentle nature is one that we could all aspire to follow.

The family would like to thank the staff of the Strathalbyn Health Centre, MOSHCC and Lakes Aged Care and Mount Barker Palliative Care Unit. His care cannot be faulted. In addition, thank you to the Milang community as a whole and the extended family and friends that have always supported Joyce, but especially in the last few months.

Extending the railway

Milang residents will have noticed that the Railway Museum is extending its track westwards from the station. The intention is to give our visitors a longer and more interesting trip on the train.



We are aiming to replace the short, out and back route with a much longer loop around the end of the Museum's property and back around into the station. Alexandrina Council have been very helpful in preparing the track bed for us and have donated a quantity of stone ballast on which the track will be laid. The aerial photo below shows the western end of the loop. The volunteers are now busy laying the track, and top dressing with ballast, at the rate of about twelve metres a week.



So where did the track originally come from? Back in 1940, at the start of the Second World War, the government decided to build a munitions depot at Smithfield, north of Elizabeth, to store munitions manufactured at the Salisbury factory. They very quickly laid forty five kilometres of track serving the many munitions store buildings of which two can still be seen off the Northern Expressway. Wagons were manufactured at the Islington railway works and four battery locomotives were purchased from Liverpool in the UK.

These trains then moved the munitions in and out of storage for the next fifty five years.

When the munitions depot closed in 1999, the trains and the track were sold at auction. The Milang Railway Museum purchased four munitions wagons, a battery locomotive, a battery charger, twenty points and operating levers and a kilometre of rail. It is that rail we are now using to extend the museum's railway.

WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR ALUMINUM BEER CANS?

The Milang Environment Centre (MEC) recycles a significant number of aluminium beer cans on behalf of the local community. This entirely volunteer operated service contributes to keeping the regional parks, streets, public areas clean and litter free, as well as reducing the waste going into landfill. MEC accepts empty aluminium beer cans at the Weeroona Street recycling depot from residents who receive cash payment for the approved deposit on each can. The post-Xmas and New Year period is particularly busy for MEC volunteers as residents bring in their empty beer cans and other containers for recycling. But have you ever wondered what happens to your empty beer cans after MEC pays you the deposit?

BEER CANS CRUSHED IN THE DEPRESSOR

Aluminium beer cans delivered by residents, or collected by MEC from major consumption sites such as the Pier Hotel and Milang Caravan Park are efficiently counted and recorded by volunteers (aka "dinosaurs"). The counted beer cans are placed into the 'The Depressor' which is the affectionate name for the compact MEC hydraulic crushing machine. 'The Depressor' crushes and significantly reduces the volume of the empty beer cans which then drop directly from the machine into a storage bale. The storage bales, each containing 800 crushed aluminium beer cans are stacked inside the MEC operations shed until there are enough bales to fill a truck for delivery to the Marine Stores recycling recovery co-ordinator facility located a long trip north -west of Milang on Port Road in Thebarton.

MARINE STORES - 'SUPER COLLECTOR'

MEC delivers bales of crushed aluminium beer cans to Marine Stores, a beverage container recovery coordinator, known under the SA Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) as a 'Super Collector', an entity that physically receives refundable, approved drink containers from authorised collection depots such as MEC for redistribution, processing, reuse, and recycling.

Marine Stores has for a long time been helping coordinate recycling in South Australia. In 1977 the SA Government introduced the first CDS in Australia guaranteeing consumers a deposit refund on every recyclable drink container sold in SA and approved by the SA Environmental Protection Agency. 'Super Collectors' such as Marine Stores work closely with the EPA and importantly, help compile updated statistical records of the amount and type of materials recovered and recycled. Through its 1977 initiative and ongoing CDS, SA has successfully led the way in the systematic collection and recycling of

drink containers, achieving a remarkable recovery rate in 2022-2023 of 76%, and thereby helping reduce litter in this state.

Each year since 2005 the recovery and recycling rate for aluminium cans such as empty beer cans has been over 75%. Annually around 660 million EPA approved drink containers sold in SA are recovered and recycled which means \$66 million has been refunded back to SA consumers.

MEC DONATIONS

The Milang Environment Centre is a volunteer operated organisation that provides a valuable community service by paying deposit refunds on aluminium, glass, plastic, and cardboard drink containers, accepting green garden waste, and metal waste for modest fees. Funds earned by MEC are used to pay operating expenses, and importantly to sponsor and support local community projects and other service organisations.

No. 1 – Arthur and Ada Stoner

Vale Mervyn Hopgood

ARTHUR STONER was born on September 6th 1879, and ADA STONER (nee Noles) on February 2nd 1884 at Goolwa. At the age of six, Ada moved to Langhorne Creek, then, at 14, she moved to Milang. Arthur Stoner was living and working at Point Sturt when he met Ada Noles. His employer was Jack Pearce of *Kindarua*. Then Arthur went to Dr Formby's farm at Strathalbyn.

Arthur and Ada were married in Milang Church on July 15th 1911, and their daughter Gladys was born in 1912. Around 1924, they bought a block of land in Milang and moved into the poultry business, with white leghorn fowls. This poultry farm included four 40 by 20 feet sheds, with a smaller shed for feed and egg packing.


My father, Winham Hopgood, built the sheds for Mr Stoner in the 1940s, but egg production influenced the necessary types of building material. Most of the eggs were sent to Angles & Co by train to Adelaide.

After retiring, Arthur and his friend Fred Stewart put on enormous amount of time into keeping the Milang Memorial Park in good order. I never thought they received their due recognition for this labour of love, with only a few hand-tools and a hostile terrain. A small tank supplied by a windmill was used to provide bore water.

Arthur and Ada's pleasure later in life was playing bowls for the Milang Club. They even had a practice rink on the south side of their home. Ada loved gardening and sewing and making fine jams and preserves.

Both Arthur and Ada were devout Church of Christ followers and worked hard all their lives for the church's cause. Their daughter Gladys also contributed in the church as organist for many years. Gladys's daughter June still lives in Milang. And James's daughter Jodie lives a few miles away and visits Milang often with her family.

Arthur died on May 23rd 1963, and Ada died on May 24th 1970. Arthur and Ada are both interned in the Milang Cemetery, after years of loyal service to Milang and the district.



CREAM AND MILK SUPPLIERS TO MILANG BUTTER FACTORY

PAT AULD

Pat Auld had a small dairy about halfway along the road on the right-hand side between the Point Sturt Road and the Clayton Finniss Road, travelling west. Pat would have supplied the Milang Butter Factory until it closed in 1951.

His land was eventually bought by the Nicolle family and is now owned by the Landseers. He named his property *Malabar*.

Pat Auld was a tall, well-built man with short curly fair hair – a splendid forward in the Milang Football team.

He teamed with Jack Mickleson in the ruck at times. At cricket, Pat was an outstanding all-rounder, big-hitting batsman and quite a fast opening bowler for the Milang Cricket Club for several years after WWII.

After leaving Milang, Pat Auld became well established in the grape and wine industry.

CLAUDE MOAR

Claude Moar was born in 1915 to Bert and Ivy Moar who were very early settlers in the Milang/Angus Plains district. Claude had an 80-acre block of land on Leslie Road, Angas Plains, five miles east of Milang. I understand he occupied the original Moar dwelling.

Claude was a tall man, who always seemed to be in a hurry – most likely to get something done between milking times. The River Angus flooded down his way in wet years, and his children had quite a difficult journey to school.

Claude had mainly Jersey cows with a few shorthorns and supplied the Milang Butter Factory with cream and then milk.

Claude's eldest daughter of three, Josie Moar, who is now 79 years old, told me recently that she used to get up at 3:30am most mornings to help her father milk and feed the dairy cows, so he could go and do casual work around the district, then she would go to school at the Milang Primary School. She had a hard time in her early years, continuously helping on the farm and assisting her two younger siblings. Josie married and had three sons and a daughter – two sons now live interstate.

The Moar families were always held in high esteem in the Milang district and helped out at many town affairs.

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
