Karyn and John Bradford Life Membership of MADCA

It is my pleasure as the incoming Chairperson to announce that Karyn and John Bradford have unanimously been nominated by the outgoing Committee for Life Membership of MADCA.



The Bradfords have been committed to the development of the Milang and District Community all their married life through their active participation in a number of Community Projects over a long period. Fair to say "Karyn's apple hasn't fallen far from the tree" in that her 94-year-old mother Pauline Perry is one of only three MADCA Life memberships granted over time.

Karyn was on the original Committee of the Milang Progress Association which then became MADCA in 2012. She served as an Alexandrina Local Councillor between 2018-2022.

Karyn was on the steering Committee that secured the tenure of the Milang Old School House from the Education Department in 2003 as a Community Centre and in 2009 Karyn and John were actively involved in the development of the adjoining 'Ace Space' to house Community activities include Day Care facilities for preschoolers.

Karyn was made a Life Member of Community Association SA in 2012 and has served over 10 years on the MADCA Committee in 2 terms as President elect.

She, along with the hardworking MADCA CEO Stuart Jones and MOSHCC staff have been instrumental in initiating the diverse Community programs that MOSHCC now deliver.

Karyn and John were also part of a steering Committee who saw potential in the purchase and renovation of the Milang Butter Factory back in 2015.

Some 10 years on, with help from Local and State Government grants secured by CEO Stuart Jones, over 12,000 volunteer hours from the 100+ MOSHCC volunteers over time coordinated by Site Foreman JB John Bradford in conjunction with Project Manager Mike Galea whereby MADCA can now proudly boast about a \$1.6m freehold Community asset.

Typical of Karyn and JB's passion and commitment to MADCA and against suggestions that the completed Butter Factory project would be a "White Elephant" Karyn and John pressed on after the official opening date 14/04 /2024 to make sure that the project became commercially viable.

Karyn not only successfully Project Managed the fit out of the Commercial Kitchen but opened the kitchen on weekends, often on her own, preparing cakes, soup, ploughman's platters, toasted sandwiches and coffee for sale to weekend visitors while JB took on the important role of the Butter Factory (meet and greet) Tour Guide.

Now , with support from the Community, along with Lyn Unwin's Girl's at "Already Read Book's" and their \$15,000 cash contribution to date, plus Norm and Glenys Foster's quarterly Country and Western Concerts - Kanoetree Wines and Lakes Home Care Tenancies plus Kitchen Sales which now include the weekly provision of over 150 + cost-effective meal servings to Lakes Home Care Clients and the Community at large - it is pleasing to report that Karyn and JB's original vision that a revitalized Milang Butter Factory could be commercially viable is now being realised.

So, please join with the Committee in the recognition of Karyn and John Bradford's significant commitment and community service to Milang and District Community Association, over a long period of time in their appointment as Life Members of MADCA to be presented by CEO Stuart Jones along with a "Milang Waters" Artwork by Ngarrindjeri Cedric Varcoe in appreciation for a job well done.

Road Trip to Milang

Just typical, the day I decide to go for a scenic drive to Milang the sky is overcast, threatening rain. Well, you can't predict the weather, especially here on the South Coast. All wrapped up in beanie, scarves, gloves and boots, not to mention thermal underwear, I could possibly be mistaken for an Arctic explorer or, at a distance, a Canadian bear. Large, brown and cumbersome. Car boot is filled with essentials, folding chair, picnic basket, blankets, coffee thermos and a brolly, useful for wet or sunny days. Into car goes Jack, and his survival pack, water, snacks, two coats, prepared for rain or sun, lead, muzzle and poop bags; I am, after all, a responsible pet owner. House locked, time to go. Car heater on, seat belt secure, CD playing a soft jazz compilation. Blast, here comes the rain. So, with windscreen wipers working overtime, and engine purring, it's off we go.

Heading out of Goolwa, along a wet, slippery, leaden road, the famed haunted house of Currency Creek comes in to view. Once deserted and neglected, many tales were told of flickering lights seen in upstairs rooms, after midnight. It's now a thriving event venue. Fortunately, the sun breaks through the dark clouds, rain ceases and it's turning into a pleasant day for my road trip. On to Winery Road. This is, for me, the scenic route to Milang, as it passes vineyards, lovely in the thin sunshine, leaves turning from summer green to autumn's russet gold. Lining the roadside,

native yakka and bracken, ahead Watchalunga canoe tree, a sad, grey sentinel.

I've driven this road many times, but only recently discovered Watchalunga Native Reserve and its purpose – protecting endangered native flora and fauna, such as the southern emu wren and the bell frog. Sad to think as a resident of the Fleurieu for many years, I know so little of its natural beauty. At Finniss River ford I'm relieved to find tall river reeds have allowed only a trickle of water through, so it's an easy crossing. Over the next causeway I glimpse the scenic Finniss estuary wending its way to the lower Murray. Onward to the riverside town of Clayton Bay, passing olive groves, bee hives, roadside stalls and the green and gold of early blossoming wattle.

The peaceful township of Clayton Bay has Stobie poles decorated with colourful mosaics, and a sheltered bay and wharf, where PS Oscar W occasionally docks. On up to Jones' Lookout, previously a huge water storage tank. The concrete base is now re-purposed into a lowwalled lookout with superb floor mosaic by talented local artist, Michael Tye. The air is so clear – and what view, across the calm river to wetlands and Hindmarsh Island! Watching purple swamp hens forage along edge of limestone cliffs, there's time for a quick comfort walk for Jack, coffee and cookie for the driver. Leaving behind the wetlands and high red cliffs of Clayton Bay, it's on to Milang. The vast waters of Lake Alexandrina are grey with soft swells lapping the low shoreline. A clear road today, this isn't always the case, occasionally this road can be awash with heavy seasonal rains.

Finally, we arrive at our destination, the historic town of Milang. Entering the town, Port Milang Railway Museum complex catches our eye, then the Anzac Memorial Gardens with its charming old-world rotunda, bowling green and avenue of trees decked out in their autumn finery. A mother strolling with a pram, the man walking

his greyhound, an older couple arm in arm, enjoying a walk in the weak afternoon sunlight, give a glimpse of life lived at a gentler pace. Milang Bakery's enticing aromas drift, beckoning us. Time to purchase a scrumptious wild cherry turnover, and say hi to Nell and Billy, the resident entertainment committee cockatoos, then it's down to the lakeside reserve for a leisurely lunch beside silver grey melaleuca, watching majestic pelicans glide effortlessly atop the gentle waves.

Milang is jam-packed with interesting snippets of historical information. Coming from Goolwa, I knew of its history, but had only a vague knowledge of the importance of Port Milang to the growth of the local area and beyond. It's a hidden treasure of our state's pioneering times, to walk the Nugget Trail was fascinating and illuminating. As Jack and I strolled the old jetty with its hand-operated crane, circa 1859, we looked back towards the brightly coloured lakeside beach shacks, shady caravan park and the Pier Hotel which opened in 1857. I decided this was the day to explore a few of the heritage buildings in the town. Along from the Pier Hotel is a building dating from 1893, the Lakeside Butter Factory, recently restored, now housing a cafe, cellar door, poetry reading and live music venue and a pre-loved book shop. Just a step or two along is Milang old schoolhouse. Opened in 1865, it is now the busy Milang Old School House Community Centre, with two immense gum trees in the front yard. That makes three amazing buildings of a bygone era finding purpose in today's world.

There is so much more to see in this surprising town, but now Jack and I head home to Goolwa, and a warm fireside. Before we leave, I visit the Milang Post Office, to collect a map designed and researched by school students of Milang. It outlines where to find the heritage buildings, providing a history of each, its

purpose then and now – a useful reference for another time. As we turn towards home, we pass the Institute Hall, dated 1884, at one time the local library, now used for community exhibitions and social events.

The day has been long, but special – a road trip back to yesteryear. Driving home we stop to gaze in awe at the newest attraction for Milang.

A creature from a time millennia ago: Milano, a towering dinosaur. So now I've seen the oldest and the newest attractions Milang has to offer the intrepid traveller. There will definitely be further road trips for Cap'n Jack and I in the very near future.



JACK AND PEARL WOODROW

Jack Woodrow was the son of Walter Woodrow Snr, and plied the Lake fishing with his brothers Jim, Walter Jnr, Dick, Harry, and his nephew Graham. Around 1930, Jack purchased the *Ada Clara*, a schooner, from LR Pavy, which he used for many years.

In 1920, Jack was prominent in the Milang Regatta Club as a committee member. In 1932 to 1933, Jack Woodrow was involved in the effort to raise money for the number three and number four tennis court completion. Jack Woodrow and Don Pearson arranged a *King Competition*, Jack represented West Milang, while Don played for East Milang. Unfortunately, the winner is unknown. In the 1938 to 1939 tennis season, Jack represented the Milang Club in the A and B Grade Premierships.

One of Jack's major contributions to Milang was his work in forming the Alexandrina Gun Club. He became its first president and worked tirelessly in that role. I believe the South Australian Gun Club Championships were held there. Jack was also responsible for the 'Legacy Shoot', with the shield being named after him.

Jack eventually owned a boat named *Helen the 2nd*, in which he ran a service over the Lake, carrying farm produce and general goods in conjunction with the railway. A small four-wheeled trailer was towed by an old car up and down from the town to the lake on rails. It was driven by a Miss Rose Fowler, who also helped with the loading of goods. Rose was a very strong lady, and could throw bags of cement around as if they were loaves of bread.

Rose lived with the Woodrows for many years and was a tremendous help, to both Pearl in the house and to Jack with his boat work on the Lake. Rose was a fantastic person who never complained and was a true warrior in life... Well done Rose Fowler!

Jack and Pearl were always available for town activities and were a highly respected couple. Jack and Pearl are both interred in the Milang Cemetery. Jack passed away in 1962, aged 73, and Pearl died in 1974, aged 84.



All Aboard

George Thomas Hobbs (Milang Station Master 1955 - 1966)

George was born at Alberton on June 16th, 1919. With his father working for the railways, the family lived in various places. As a young child, he started school at Mount Mary, near Morgan then Tarlee, Hamley Bridge, Gawler, and Lyndoch where he attended the Gawler High School until leaving at 16 years of age.

George had a couple of minor jobs before he started a forty year career with the South Australian Railways. He started as a clerk at Port Adelaide and Mile End Railway stations before going to Mt. Gambier for 3 years. Then at Mile End and Woodville before moving to the country with short periods at Tanunda, Naracoorte, Yongala, Francis and back to Naracoorte again.

George married Alice Doris Watchorn, known as Doris or "Dot" on August 17th 1946 at Glenelg, the start of a happy 43 years of marriage. They had three daughters Jillian, Rosemary and Helen.

In 1955 he was appointed Station Master at Milang where they stayed for eleven years. The longer stay gave George and his family an opportunity to become more involved with the town and the community. The three girls attended Milang Primary School first and then Jillian and Rosemary went to Strathalbyn High School and played Netball and Tennis for Milang. Doris was a stay at home mother but took up dressmaking for people in the town. She judged the sewing at the town fetes and belonged to the Mothers' Club and the Church of England guild. George was on the Milang Progress Association, worked as an electoral officer during State & Federal elections and joined the Milang Bowling Club.





The railway house in Milang was a very basic house in 1955 when the family moved in. They had to bring curtains and floor coverings with them and there was **NO ELECTRICITY** in the house! Lamps and torches were used for lighting, the refrigerator ran on kerosene while the kitchen wood stove heated water for making a cup of tea and washing dishes, etc. It was also used for cooking meals and heating up the metal irons, which once hot, were used for ironing clothes. In the bathroom, a chip heater was lit to heat bath water. In the laundry, located in a shed in the back yard, the water was heated by lighting a fire under the copper. The kitchen, a separate room at the back of the house, was warm in the winter and hot in the summer, because of the wood stove being constantly lit and there was a wood heater in the lounge room. Fortunately, electricity was later connected to the house but there was no hot water service or electric stove supplied....no such luxuries in a Railway House! The family purchased their own small electric stove to use, particularly in summer months when the wood stove made the kitchen unbearable.

The toilet was attached to the laundry shed in the back yard. In 1955, this was the "empty the bucket" type with a septic tank being installed during the late 1950's.

On arrival there was no garden at the railway house other than a few trees, including two pepper trees and a large fig tree. The large grounds were sandy and overgrown with weeds. George and Doris were keen gardeners and established an extensive vegetable garden on the western side of the house. This supplied the

family with plenty of vegetables in season. Fruit trees, lawns and flower beds were planted at the front and rear of the house which improved the property for living and for children running around.

A large hen house was built early on and George built a shed in the back yard for his car and to provide an area

at the rear for his workbench and tools. Later, a much larger section was added to the car shed to house a caravan that George built for family holidays at various beach locations, particularly Port Elliot.

George was a keen photographer and developed his own photographs amongst the preserves and bottles of ginger beer in the cellar at Milang. He took coloured slides of the 1956 Flood and impressive black & white prints of the flour mill chimney coming down in 1958. On one occasion, when he was the chief photographer for the Milang Debutant Ball but found that a wrong setting left the film completely blank. The debutants had to put on their white dresses again the following day for a repeat session.

George, Doris and family left Milang in about the September of 1966. George took a position as clerk at the Pooraka, Dry Creek and Gawler stations before retiring in 1979 at the age of 60. They had their own home built, a luxury after a lifetime of living in railways houses!

After Doris died suddenly in 1990, George continued to live on his own at Pooraka for ten years before moving to a retirement home for three years. He passed away on January 16th 2004 at the age of 84½ years.

EMPLOYEES OF MILANG BUTTER FACTORY

The Prouten Family

Edward Prouten was born 12th March 1823 at West Wittering, Sussex, England. He was 15 years of age when he came to South Australia on a three-masted square-rigged teak ship, the *Rajasthan*, built by Nowrojee Jamsetjee Wadia at the Bombay Dockyards. The ship was 126 feet long, 29 feet wide and 22 feet 7 inches deep.


Captained by Duncan Ritchie, the *Rajasthan* left Plymouth, England on 31st July 1838 and arrived in South Australia on 16th November 1838, after one hundred and twenty-two days at sea.

Edward's first job in South Australia was drawing water and cutting grass for the thatching of wattle and daub houses. Edward first took up land at Echunga. He married Ann Mott in 1848 and moved to Lake Plains in the late 1850s. Edward and Ann had 14 children, but nine died at an early age.


Edward and Ann's 12th child, Edward Joseph Prouten, married Mary Elizabeth Anderson in 1893, and they lived in a small two-roomed house by the Bremer River. It was later demolished, and the stone used to add rooms to Edward's parents' house at Lake Plains. Edward Joseph was born and educated at Lake Plains, while Mary was born at Moyston in Victoria. They had two daughters: Mabel and Ivy. Edward and Mary continued working Edward's parents' property with a dairy herd as well as a piggery. The property at Lake Plains was Block 41, Watson Park and consisted of 92 acres.

The Proutens fed their separated milk to their pigs and took the cream to the Milang Butter Factory by horse and cart. Edward and Mary had a Mellotte milk separator, which worked well but was a difficult machine to clean—each day it took their daughter Mabel a great deal of time to perform this important duty. The separator room was a cellar in the front garden which meant the milk had to be taken down the stairs, separated, and the skimmed milk lugged up for the pigs. The cream was then stored in the cellar until it was taken to the Milang Butter Factory, perhaps twice a week.

I can remember being on the high school bus and seeing their daughter Mabel attending the dairy cows as we passed by. In 1951, the Prouten property was purchased by their granddaughter Phyllis and her husband Frank Noske, who continued a successful dairying business for some years. Edward passed away in 1906 and Ann in 1920. Edward Joseph died in 1947 and his wife Mary in 1955—all are interred in the Milang Cemetery.

Milang Community Garden Newsletter September 2025

It's been a busy August with cleaning up old, finished plantings and preparation of beds for the new crops. Ongoing soil care is important with the use of manures and natural nutritional products. The produce crops have been down again due mainly to the strange growing season. The tomatoes, capsicum and eggplants kept on producing well past their growing season. The pumpkins were very poor, taking a long time to ripen. The cauliflowers struggled with an infestation of aphids. Much attention has been on cleaning up and coping with massive weed overgrowth and invasion of gum tree roots and kikuyu throughout the garden.

Our gardeners have been concentrating on cleaning out beds and preparing for the new plantings of onions, carrots, parsnips and new greens, to name but a few! The berries went into hyper growth, taking over the grape vine and invading all areas of the back corner of the garden. It is an ongoing difficult job to get these under control. In order to control the weed growth, we are covering the orchard area with cardboard and thick layers of mulch, rather than resorting to mowing and spraying. The Kikuyu has to be hand dug, which is time consuming and hard work! Cleaning up such a large space generates a lot of green waste. Our chief compost experts have changed the design of the composting bays to make it easier to manage. The mulcher has been working over time! Along with composting and mulching, nasty weeds have to be excluded from the compost and taken to the green waste at the MEC or put into the green waste bins for council pick up. We must acknowledge the MEC guys who support us by taking large amounts of green waste.

The orchard trees have been pruned and we are now seeing the first blossoms appearing. The lemon tree has produced excellent lemons after being nursed back from a very severe infestation of black sooty mould. Thanks to Margo for her diligent work in cleaning and controlling this nasty mould and for her constant care of the fruit trees.

Our members are extremely committed to the garden, often putting in extra hours during the week to tend to the plants and maintenance that cannot be completed during the regular Tuesday sessions.
