The monthly MADCA meeting was held on Thursday 30th of October 2025 with all in attendance.

Lyn Unwin's application to fill one of the two remaining Committee positions was acknowledged and accepted. One Committee position remains available for your nomination.

Lakes Home Care Manager Annie Whyte presented the Lakes Home Care Monthly Clinical Report and provided feedback on the progress re the change over to the new Federal Government "Support at Home Program" which took effect on 1st of November 2025.

MADCA CEO Stuart Jones presented his monthly report.

The Diversity and Cultural Inclusion Policy, Community Involvement Policy, and Communication Policies were table and ratified by the Committee.

Butter Factory casual staff training to improve
Barista skills and service confidence have been
attended. Regular music events including the "Open
Mic -Pizza night" has been well received. Norm and
Glenys's Country Western Concert was a success.

Fantastic news that The Youth Hub were winners at this years Impact 100 awards which comes with a substantial grant to support the Youth Hub activities and full renovation of the Old Regatta Club. Well done to all involved.

We now have 92 volunteers (up from 90 in September). Please contact Volunteer Co-Ordinator Vickie Schmidt (8537 0687) if you would like to join.

Treasurer, Karen Burkinshaw presented the MADCA financial report for the month ending 30th of September 2025 and confirmed on-going consulting with CEO Stuart Jones and Finance Officer Cheryl Norton on reviewing our accounting procedures.

Secretary, Cathy Fish tabled her "Actions and Motions" spreadsheet and reported favourably on Actions requiring attention.

Committee member Ros Francis provided an update on the Community Garden and reported on their award at the recent Strathalbyn Show as the Champion Productive Garden. Well done to everyone at the Community Garden.

The funding for re-netting of the fruit trees was given the go-ahead. Discussions with garden representative Alan Burkenshaw for a more permanent solution are progressing.

Vice Chairperson, Mike Gelea presented the Milang Butter Factory Business Plan identifying the strategic direction/priorities which was ratified by the Committee to be conveyed to Butter Factory Operation sub-committee. Cost benefit analysis to follow.

Committee person Penny Whittaker promoted the need to gate off the jetty to protect the bird life from harassment at the Dog Park. A letter raising the issue with Council is to be formulated and tabled at next MADCA Public meeting on 27/11/2025.

step back be the observer life will unfold crumpled and creased




Return Cari Bertram



Shockingly simple to help save a life

Monday, 20 October 2025

Over 32,000 people a year suffer an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest in Australia, almost 4,000 of those occur in South Australia. Sadly, only 1 in 10 of them survive.

National 'Restart a Heart Day' was celebrated in October to bring awareness to the importance of using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) during a cardiac arrest.

According to The Heart Foundation, when an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) is used in conjunction with CPR in the first 3 to 5 minutes of a cardiac arrest, the chance of surviving jumps to around 70 percent.

Nine community and sporting centres in Milang, Finniss and Clayton Bay have just received funding to assist with the cost of purchasing and installing AED's in their building or facility.

Member for Finniss David Basham MP, who recently had an AED installed in his own Finniss Electorate Office in Victor Harbor, said he was pleased to see so many of these lifesaving devices were now more accessible in his community.

"Saving a life can be made easier, even without a great deal of training because AED's are designed so that a person just needs to follow the verbal prompts to give someone in cardiac arrest a better chance of survival."

"We have people visiting the office every day, some of them are coming because of health concerns. We also provide a regular meeting place for community groups and many of these people are seniors."

"I hope the AED is never needed, but to have it close at hand just adds peace of mind for anyone inside or near the office."

Jennie Politis is a regularly user of the Finniss Office meeting room with the Victor Harbor VIEW Club. She is pleased the office now has an AED on site, "We can get a bit passionate about things in our meetings, so it is reassuring to know there is the ability to intervene immediately with the prospect of saving lives in our community."

New AED laws were introduced in South Australia this year making access to the devices mandatory in certain buildings, facilities and vehicles, with the aim to improve survival rates from sudden cardiac arrest by increasing their public access.

The AED at the Finniss Electorate Office is located at 71 Victoria Street Victor Harbor and available during office hours from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday.

Rakali

Heading: Meet our river rodent - rakali!



The Latin name for rakali (*Hydromys chrysogaster*) is beautifully descriptive – golden bellied water mouse. Except rakali is neither a mouse, nor a rat!

With an orange belly, a white tipped tail, webbed feet and black or brown waterproof fur, rakali is a rodent, and, with the platypus, a uniquely Australian freshwater mammal.

While rakali is a Ngarrindjeri word, the species is found throughout Australia, and the research project by the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth (CLLMM) Research Centre will contribute essential knowledge about this little-known native.

You may come across Hannah McKennall, an Honours student at Flinders University, as she sets up cameras and bait stations in the region, undertaking the largest research into rakali ever in South Australia.

Hannah is collecting data about diet, reproductive patterns, behaviour, habitat preferences, population size, and distribution in wetlands in and near Goolwa.

"Rakali are really under-researched and we just don't' know enough about them. Some people think they are shy and elusive, others that they are coming closer to humans as opportunistic feeders, scavenging from bins, and from pet bowls for example," she says.

"The more we know about rakali they more we can determine how they may be affected by environmental changes including drought and floods, and also how infrastructure and housing in and around the Goolwa township may affect their habitats and behaviours, compared to more natural research areas at Currency Creek, Finniss River and Watchalunga Reserve."

Rakali provide indicators of the health of our ecosystems, and we need greater understanding of their distribution and population structure for ongoing wetland monitoring and conservation.

Currently, knowledge comes from public sightings and citizen science efforts.

Hannah's project will run through to November, using motion sensitive cameras to record images, and conducting live trapping at each site. Animals will be assessed for injuries and reproductive status, diet, weight and growth, and some will have PIT tags implanted to continue scientific monitoring.

"Our findings will have significant contributions for the conservation and management actions of rakali populations locally and throughout Australia," Hannah says.

CLAYTON COMMUNITY HALL - A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

The Clayton Community Hall came about by the few residents who could see the need for a gathering place for the community and a meeting was arranged at the Yabby City restaurant in 1983. The group, which was all the people of Clayton, was successful in applying and receiving a Commonwealth-State Community Employment Program Grant.

This was the largest project under the program and unlike other projects in the area, this was not under the supervision of the District Council (Strathalbyn) but was administered by a local hall committee headed by Henry Jones.

The project was granted \$73,000 for labour and \$39,000 for materials.

The local contribution required was \$40,000 but \$10,000 of this was allowed for supervising and administration work, which was carried out voluntarily and at no cost to the project.

The District Council gave \$2,500.

Many different ways fundraising were used as this was a very small community to raise \$30,000. There were trading tables, fancy dress functions, many held outdoors, bingo nights, Melbourne Cup lunches, sausage sizzles, yabby races, sale of bricks, bottle collection etc.

On 15th November 1985 Hon Alexander Downer opened the hall which was free of debt.

There has been much fun and games in the hall over the past fifteen years including birthday parties, weddings, anniversaries, balls, cabarets, various other celebrations, landcare meetings, fishermens meetings, council meetings, quilting groups, art and craft shows, bingo nights, weekly get-togethers for local residents, for bowls, table tennis, cards, eight ball etc.

Obituary: David Stanbridge Clayton Bay Boat Club

It was a bitter/sweet day on Friday 19th September 2025.

The bitter:

Dave, "Davo" Stanbridge died at about 3:30 in the afternoon. Davo joined the Clayton Bay Boat Club in the mid-eighties and was a regular participant in the early Rat Race Regattas and other Club races including the Tom Bentley Trophy, which was instituted in 1985 and held on Opening Day of the boating season.

He developed his love of competitive sailing in his Farr 6, "Ayla" at the Glenelg Yacht Club for several years before joining our club in the eighties where he continued to sail Ayla in Club races.

Davo was a regular attendee at the monthly barbecues where he was a keen supporter of his children (son Darren is Commodore of CBBC) and grandchildren through his 'thoughtful analysis' of their performances out on the water. Up until earlier this year, when he entered a nursing home, Davo could often be seen with binoculars checking out the competitors in CBBC monthly sailing events and of course, later in the day, 'thoughtfully analysing' their performances!

A few years ago, when the population of Farr 6 boats increased in the Club, it was decided to introduce a trophy for the fastest Farr 6 in the Sunday Sprint Series of races. It was named after Davo, and the Dave Stanbridge Trophy has been presented to the Farr 6 with the most winning times across each season, ever since.

Davo was an active member, committee member and volunteer in the CBBC and he was granted Life Membership for his service to the CBBC in 2021.

Members valued his friendship and that of Davo's beloved partner, Maxine and mourn his loss to the Club and to members' lives.

Deepest sympathies to Darren, Justin, Narelle and all the family at this sad time.


This visit was planned over the past year and certainly promoted Milang as there were Veteran Cars (pre 1919) from all states of Australia on the Rally.

EMPLOYEES OF MILANG BUTTER FACTORY

William and Innes Yelland

ill Yelland was born at Narrung and came to Point Sturt about the same time as his Bir Tehala Was John Living Broperties with Lake Alexandrina frontage. Bill had quite a large herd of Jersey milking cows—some of the biggest framed Jerseys anywhere in the district.

Bill always purchased high performance bulls in the hope of improving his herd, which he did. Bill's property consisted of quite a lot of limestone outcrops and areas of salt swamps. It was thought that this mix, and the herd being so well looked after, made his Jerseys so large framed. At first, milk and cream from Bill Yelland's dairy would have gone to his brother Joseph's cheese factory until it closed in 1917. He sent it to the Milang Butter Factory thereafter.

Horse drawn vehicles were the mode of transport in the early years, after which the South Australian Farmers' Union supplied a milk pick up by motor truck for their factory at Milang.

In the late 1800s, Bill was a keen cricketer for the Point Sturt Cricket Club. He kept a keen interest in cricket all his life. On one occasion, when Bill was in the Strathalbyn Hospital, some of the Milang cricketers, including myself, paid him a visit on the way home after beating Ashbourne at Ashbourne. He was rapt and said it made him feel much better. For some time, on Saturday evenings, in the cricket season, Bill would phone me and want to know the Milang cricket scores of the match.

Bill and his wife Innes were devout Church of Christ followers; their church being situated next to their home and farm.

The first job I had after leaving high school was helping my father repair and paint the Yelland homestead with the help of Bill's son, Graham. Graham eventually took over the running of the property and made massive improvements to the dairy, sheds, water supply, etc. He also largely increased the Jersey cow dairy herd.

When Graham eventually had to employ a share farmer in the dairy, things changed, and Friesian milking cows were introduced. Graham often helped the Milang Cricket Club as a player and with transport, which was much appreciated.

The Yellands were great people for the Milang and Point Sturt areas and contributed to many organisations for many years. Bill Yelland passed away on 13th October 1960, and is buried in the Point Sturt cemetery with many of his family.





Competition on 11 October. Milang's Division 5 will play against Strathalbyn and Division 3 against Myponga.


At the start of the Open Day, Club President Brian

in the orchard using cardboard and mulch. The vegetable planting is well organised using a large white board to keep track of the vegetable types in the numbered beds.

The garden is looking very green with lots of silver beet and spinach around. The peas have produced three big crops and the bugs so far have not been as bad. The tomatoes are planted and growing well and we are already getting some early fruit from the tunnel.

Many of the new crops are in, with more planting to be done. We look forward to harvesting the Spring and Summer produce in the coming weeks.

The gardeners like to experiment with companion planting and beneficial plantings. This attracts bees and other good bugs to stay in the garden, reduces the reliance on chemical pesticides etc. It also helps the soil and keeps the moisture in.

MILANG CFS NEWS

Milang CFS Brigade has been fairly busy with jobs over the past few months, attending a variety of events including two car fires, a car accident, grass fires and some fallen trees.





Also, on the 19th of October a horse broke free from its owner and made its way about 300 metres into the reeds east of the Milang Regatta Club.







A combined effort from CFS, SES, and some locals eventually found the horse with an infrared camera on a drone. The horse was suffering from exhaustion and minor injuries.

Once the horse was removed from the water, the decision was made to make a drag-mat from a heavy tarpaulin, wrap the horse in it and drag the 400kg animal by hand over 200 metres through the reeds back the lake road. Then it was winched up the hill and loaded into a float to be taken to a vet. The hard work of dragging the horse was a distraction from the thoughts of treading on snakes or perhaps even being eaten by a crocodile that was imagined by some to be hiding amongst the reeds!

The Brigade has also been busy with pre-fire-season trainings including the annual burn over drill and pumping exercises done with the Clayton Brigade.

The start of the fire ban season for the Murraylands is from November 1, spanning to April 30, 2026. Milang, Langhorne Creek and Clayton Bay are in the Murraylands region. Strathalbyn CFS Group Officer Greg Pfeiffer said the dates are determined by considering soil dryness and the weather conditions the state has faced. He said the region is in a green drought, meaning there has been enough rain for pastures, but the deeper layers of soil are still dry.

Milang CFS urge people to start looking at the fire breaks on their properties and fence lines, and to start clearing and cutting the grass near their houses, as well as cleaning out gutters and removing flammable materials from around houses and buildings.



HISTORIC GRAVES OF THE MILANG CEMETERY

THE TINKS FAMILY

In 1870, the lake trade was in full swing. 1868 saw Captain James Tinks take the steamer *Telegraph* to McGrath's Flat on the Coorong for a trip inspection. James Tinks commissioned the building of the steamer *Wilcannia* in 1875, trading with her on the River Darling until he died on 18th October 1889.

Bill Tinks, James's son was a highly successful river captain. Among the boats he commanded were the *Corowa*, the *Waikerie*, the *Success*, the *Canally*, and the *Murrabit*.



On the 27th December 1866, the steamer *Telegraph* left Milang Jetty for an excursion on arrangement with Cobb & Co. Around 80 passengers set out for Meningie under the command of Captain William Tinks. But disaster struck, with a passenger, Mr Joseph Turvey, falling overboard. A search was made for several hours but no sign of his body was found. This tragic event cast a gloom over the passengers and the steamer *Telegraph* returned to Milang, arriving at 11am.

Captain Tinks' daughter Eliza (Dolly) married Ern Dunk, and she was the first President of Milang Red Cross. Frank Potts built the steamer *Wilcannia* in 1875 for Captain Tinks. He used timber grown at Echunga. The *Wilcannia* traded for many years along the Murray and Darling Rivers.

In the 1873 school exams, William Tinks was awarded for maths, Anne Tinks for writing and Eliza Tinks for general proficiency. The Tinks family were instrumental in the opening of the Milang Institute in 1883-1884. The Institute was built by J Oldfield.

The Tinks' property was situated on the south-west side of McDonald Street in Milang and consisted of approximately 500 acres. This area was used for the combined Oddfellows and Rechabite Lodges' annual picnic on Friday 19th October 1886. The Tinks family were members of the Milang Congregational Church; and the sixtieth Jubilee of Queen Victoria was celebrated there in June 1897 with several services conducted in the church. These services were addressed by RJ Blackwell, Mrs Tinks and Mrs Mitchell of Point Sturt. Later in the day, the three concerned each planted a pine tree.

The two Tinks boys, William and James were outstanding cricketers for the Milang Club – William an allrounder and James a fast-scoring batsman. They also played football for Milang. There are six members of the Tinks family buried in the Milang Cemetery: Edwin 1871, son of James (nine months old), James, 1975, son of James (five years), James, son of James 1877 (two years), Kate 1883 (12 years), James 1889 (61 years), and Kate Catherine 1909 (72 years).
