# Chairperson's Monthly Report November 2025



MADCA quarterly Public Meeting was held on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> of November 2025 at the Milang Institute.

Kylie Markow Alexandrina Council Community
Development Officer and Milang Youth Hub
Volunteer Katie Whittham provided an update of
local youth activities and the exciting developments
planned for the Youth Hub following the success in
securing the \$100,000 Impact 100 award which will
fund a much needed upgrade to the old Clubhouse
facilities.

MADCA CEO Stuart Jones confirmed approval of a \$2000 SA Government grant to fund AED Defibrillator unit installation at the Milang Institute and The Youth Hub along with a commitment by the Eastern Fleurieu School at Milang to donate an AED Unit to be installed at the Butter Factory.

In addition, Stuart has been successful in securing a \$2340 SA Govt. Social Impact grant to install temporary fruit tree Bird netting at the Community Garden with a more permanent solution to be coordinated by Community Garden volunteer Alan Burkinshaw in conjunction with JB"s Butter Factory maintenance crew into the new year.

We now have 92 Volunteers registered. Volunteer Co-ordinator Vicki Schmidt (8537 0687) will welcome your contact if you would like to join. Exciting news, Vicki's role is to be expanded to incorporate the role of Community and Neighbourhood Development Officer to facilitate numerous Milang Old School House Community Centre (MOSHCC) activities. Our Volunteers Christmas Luncheon at the Butter Factory is scheduled for the 12<sup>th</sup> of December 2025.

Good news. Our Monthly newsletter is now distributed to over 500 email recipients.

# 5 WAYS IN 5 DAYS TO WELLBEING

Our first workshop '5 Ways in 5 Days to Wellbeing – Be Educated' was recently held in the Milang Lakeside Butter Factory and it was a real privilege to have been gifted this opportunity to facilitate a workshop supporting Mental Health and Wellbeing. This has been a well-received opportunity to work in collaboration with our local stakeholders to strengthen our community and the Milang and District Community Association (MADCA) team wish to thank Daryl Pederson for providing us with this opportunity from our local Lakeside Men's Shed in Milang, with funding provided from SA Health.

The initial proposal to hold a Wellbeing forum, has led to the first of 5 projected workshops, inspired by the Alexandrina Councils Community Wellbeing Action Plan 2022-26 which was formed through a collaborative process, involving the Community Wellbeing Advisory Forum, members of the community and extensive community engagement. Some of our MADCA members also contributed to the plan, our dedicated volunteer, previous Chair and now life member Karyn Bradford our CEO, Stuart Jones and Volunteer Coordinator, Vickie Schmidt as well as many individuals, groups, organisations and networks.

The creation of the Alexandrina Council Community Wellbeing Action Plan showcased ways to provide support and information to our community by ensuring everyone feels welcome and supported, with specific targeted questions collated, and priorities and aspirations were identified for Wellbeing.

With this inspiration, the 5 Ways in 5 Days to Wellbeing was created, focusing on supporting Mental Health and Wellbeing to our local community. The first session hosted three presenters who showcased their skills and knowledge, teaching different ways to support self and others by connecting with local providers, support services and creative processes.

# Heading: Five million plants - who's counting?



As Spring approaches, fieldwork begins with researchers revisiting sites to gauge the success of a major revegetation program.

Over five million native plants were sown in response to the Millennial Drought, funded by federal and state governments under The Coorong Lower Lakes Murray Mouth Recovery Program.

A diverse team is collaborating on key areas of the CLLMM Research Centre project *Ecosystems* responses and sociocultural perspectives on CLLMM landscape and revegetation, following 2015 data collected at 80 revegetation sites and 20 remnant sites.

Ten years on, how has revegetation helped our ecosystem recover?

"From September researchers will revisit these sites and evaluate how the ecosystem is responding, include using satellite imagery to understand where areas have changed in terms of canopy coverage," says Dr Sacha Jellinek, University of Melbourne. He has been involved since 2012, when many local nurseries produced plants similar to existing bushland, and community groups contributed to the planting.

The project team - which includes universities (Flinders, Melbourne and Adelaide), environmental organisations (AU2100, Second Nature Conservancy, Birdlife Australia, Nature Glenelg Trust), community groups (Hindmarsh Island Landcare and First Nations) and government (SARDI, Coorong District Council) - will focus on soil, birds and revegetation plantings.

A survey of revegetation practitioners, landowners, community and First Nations groups will help with understanding the perceived benefits, priorities, and challenges of revegetation plantings in the region

"Large scale revegetation is seldom monitored so its very important that we can learn how effective these areas of plantings over time, and how effective they are for ecosystem biodiversity," says Sacha.

"Monitoring is vital going forwards as we consider more diverse ways to try to make native vegetation more resilient."

Nature Glenelg Trust will survey the original 76 sites from 2015, assessing species cover crust cover and exposed bare ground, and the presence of grazing animals and any other disturbances.

Birdlife Australia will lead observational studies at three times over two days to ensure all bird species are recorded at a site. This will take place at the 30 revegetated and 16 remnant sites from 2015.

Staff from Flinders University will collect surface soil samples for environmental DNA (eDNA) analysis at all original 76 sites.

This project will improve understanding of revegetation plantings in the CLLMM region, how they may be affected by climate change, and, through consultation, help inform future plans and activity.

#### MILK AND CREAM SUPPLIERS TO MILANG BUTTER FACTORY

## **Arthur Pearce**

Arthur Pearce's property consisted of approximately 1,900 acres and was situated along the Point Sturt Road, opposite the Point Sturt Church of Christ and named *Poldea*.

Australian Illawarra Shorthorn and shorthorn cattle made up his milking herd of about 45 cows. Most likely, at times, the cows were hand milked, but an *Eclipse* milking machine was installed very early, being one of the first milking machines in the state. Arthur Pearce also purchased a large milk separator, allowing him to send quite large quantities of cream to the Milang Butter Factory. As was the case in the early years, transport to the Milang Butter Factory of cream and milk was by horse and cart, and a little by motor vehicle. Eventually, the factory owners, South Australian Farmers' Union, provided a truck for the purpose of picking up the cream and milk around the district, including Point Sturt.

In later years, Arthur's daughter Jean had her own herd of Guernsey milking cows, which I believe became a stud in later years. Jean worked for many years at *Poldea*, until moving to Christies Beach, then a retirement facility. Jean passed away at 105 years of age. She held her driving licence until she was 95 years old!

The Pearces had a long history at Point Sturt. Some of their land was not the best, with saltpans and limestone outcrops making work quite difficult at times, nevertheless, the cattle were well looked after, large framed, and production was of a satisfactory standard.

The Pearces were devout members of the Church of Christ and were a great benefit and help in the Point Sturt district. Arthur Pearce died in 1934; his wife Jane predeceasing him in 1905, during the birth of their only child Jean. All are buried in the Point Sturt cemetery.







Next came the 2005 HOLDEN 'EFIJY'. (Pictured) In 2007 it won the Nth American concept car of the year. Representing both a homage to the classic Holden FJ and a nod to custom and hot rod design. It is powered with a 6.0 litre Gen III supercharged V8.

Leaving Milang at 09.00am with 6 Stickybeaks on board, it was decided with Vickies great support and help that the National Museum at Birdwood would be a great place to visit this month. The Milang Environment Centre is facing an uncertain future due to several issues challenging the local not-for-profit community service organisation. MEC reluctantly did not open on Saturday 18 October because of insufficient numbers of volunteers available to operate the recycling depot. MEC Boss Dinosaur **Geoff Dungey** told MCN that MEC has been struggling to operate in recent times as volunteer numbers and availability diminishes. "We met with Alexandrina Council recently and outlined the challenges facing MEC and they confirmed that all regional service organisations are having trouble finding enough volunteers."

The small group of volunteers at MEC have held several meetings and BBQ's during which they discussed the future operation of MEC in response to current and future challenges.


The MEC has never been busier in its' long history. Volunteers are processing an increasing number of recyclable items: counting items, paying refunds, storing items and transporting items to super-collector depots. In 2027 the SA Govt will introduce deposit refunds on ALL drink containers except plain milk and the number of recyclable items the MEC anticipates processing will increase as much as 50%.

MEC has recently introduced new cost and laboursaving methods of storing and transporting recyclables including using large cages for plastic bottles and soft drink cans. MEC also undertook steps to upgrade the dirt road and infrastructure. Nevertheless, one of the major challenges MEC faces is the cost of maintaining aging machinery such as trucks and forklifts. Geoff Dungey said, "MEC must reduce operating costs even as our income significantly increases due to more recyclables being processed. We have decided to stop accepting Op-Shop type items because we simply do not make money storing them longterm. Frankly, we are not sure how MEC is going to cope with increased flow of recyclables as our volunteer numbers reduce."

Several MEC volunteers serve other community service organisations too. Long-term MEC volunteer **Chris Lambert** also gives time to **CFS** and **Sharon Parker** helps at the **Community Garden**.

**Geoff Dungey** believes, "MEC cannot expect volunteers to undertake increasing workload as MEC gets busier, especially when wine bottles and nearly all other drink containers enter the SA deposit refund scheme in 2027."

#### HISTORIC GRAVES OF THE MILANG CEMETERY

#### **ALBERT HENRY LANDSEER**

Albert Henry Landseer was born in London in 1829. Journalists gave him several title: 'Father of the House of Assembly', for his long service in the house of assembly; and 'Duke of Milang', because of his 50 years as Milang's most influential citizen. He was the cousin of Sir Edwin Landseer, famous animal painter. One of Sir Edwin's masterpieces *Monarch of the Glen* is still housed at Milang. On August 8<sup>th</sup>, 1883, AH Landseer laid the foundation stone of the Milang Institute, which was opened on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1884, with celebrations and entertainment held in the 'Mill Store' owned by Albert.

Albert Landseer owned dairy, east of the township of Milang, with approximately 50 cows which were milked there under the care of Mr Jolly. A survey in the 1860s for a report to parliament, listed that Milang had 109 lots; 94 sold, and six lots were designated as government reserves. Of the 94 blocks sold, the government revenue was £2,016, with Albert Henry Landseer being a purchaser.

In 1858, Albert was granted permission to operate a post office in his store at Milang. A steam mill was built by Albert Pavy in 1856. It burnt down in 1869, and the machinery was bought by Albert, who completed a new mill in 1871. In 1864, the tender for the Milang School of £345 was accepted. A Mr Roland Nutt was successful, and Albert Landseer was a trustee with six other gentlemen. A photo of the School Board, taken in 1857, shows AH Landseer's business headquarters with chimney and four-storey building. AH Landseer successfully moved, on June 25<sup>th</sup>, 1866, that there be a daily mail run to and from Adelaide by train. This daily rail run commenced on January 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1867.


In 1859, AH Landseer's name appears as purchaser of blocks of land at Clayton. In 1959, after the death of AH Landseer's son Laurie, who was a manager at the time, the premises was sold to GA Schubert. In 1860, Mrs AH Landseer was a member of the Milang Voluntary Defence Corps, and was a signatory to a petition to scrap the Bremer District Council and form the Alexandrina District Council — which was successful. AH Landseer's parliamentary career began, and he was the driving force to get the railway to Milang. In his social activities, AH Landseer welcomed the Governor of South Australia, Sir WFD Jervois to a fundraiser in the Landseer Store in 1877. In 1892, AH Landseer hosted a large delegation of MPs, to discuss the 'Irrigation Scheme'. However, Professor Lowrie's report deemed the scheme unsuitable and it failed.

From the 1880s, the Church of England services were held in the Wharf Store of the Landseer Dock, and regularly attended by the Landseer family. Albert Henry was a keen Milang cricketer and a great organizer of their social activities. His son, Horace, played for Milang Cricket Club in the 1920s with great success. Albert's son Charles was on the committee for the Milang Sheep Dog Trials in 1935, and was treasurer of the RSL.

AH Landseer was well-known for beginning a large business enterprise dealing with Murray River trade; towns included in this venture were Milang – the base, Goolwa, Morgan, Victor Harbor, Murray Bridge, Wentworth, Mildura, Meningie and Wilcannia. In 1876, AH Landseer's River Darling trade began with the steamer *Bourke*, which was built by Frank Potts of Langhorne Creek.

Albert Henry Landseer's sons owned land in the scrubland of the Milang area, with son Laurie owning *Wooralie* around 1930. Another son, Horace, was treasurer of Milang Regatta Club in the 1920s. In recognition of her tireless work for the Red Cross, Mrs Ida Landseer, wife of Charles, received her 60-years' service badge – one of the few in the state.

In 1942, the 'Spotters Post' was roomed at the back of AH Landseer's four-storey building, in a mall room in conjunction with the WWII effort. Albert Henry Landseer died in 1906 and is buried in the Milang Cemetery with his second wife, Harriet, and many of his descendants.
